Students must successfully complete the courses required by the board and Iowa Department of Education in order to graduate.

It is the responsibility of the superintendent to ensure that students complete grades one through twelve and that high school students complete 48.0 credits prior to graduation. The following credits will be required for graduation:

Financial Literacy	1.0

The required courses of study will be reviewed by the board annually.

Prior to graduation, the district will advise students on how to successfully complete the free application for federal student aid.

Graduation requirements for special education students will include successful completion of four years of English, three years of math, three years of social studies and three years of science.

Students who complete a regular session in the Legislative Page Program of the general assembly at the state capitol will be credited ½ credit of social studies.

Students enrolled in a junior officers' training corp. will receive 1/8th physical education credit for each semester the student is enrolled in the program.

Note: This is a mandatory policy

Note: Students are no longer required to have financial literacy as a graduation requirement. However, financial literacy is still required to be offered and taught, either as a standalone course or through units of coursework. The GLR Board of Education has determined to require financial literacy.
